


Ramblings From The Editor







Now I am almost finished with the Howard GH-1 dimer from your plan and hope it flies as good.




Another note from Mike to Mike:

Once again a fun project. This one took a bit more adjusting and trimming but flies great in our indoor soccer arena site on partial turns. Hope I still have one of them, this or the Miles, left when we get to Geneseo.

I tried something new for me with the markings. Rather than print decal paper I printed the star & bar on white tissue, similar to the way Easy Built markings are done. Sealed the ink with a dusting of Model Master Dull Coat and then chalked the back to bring out the white a bit more. I dusted the chalk with fixative and then when dry applied glue stick to the back of the tissue. After letting it dry a couple of days, just trimmed them out with a Xacto, set in place and touched with alcohol to reset the glue stick. It worked faster and neater than decals for me.


Making Tissue Markings

This method works great for most national insignia and for Just a quick note to let you know that I just built and finished the larger solid pieces, N Numbers, Light Stripes on a dark model, etc. For markings, first you need to create a text document in whatever 2008. Was impressed, as when I looked on the computer for photo's system you use. Then find the marking or markings you wish to the first one I found was the scheme on the plan which is the scheme reproduce and cut and paste it or them into your text document. 
Once you have them in a document and the correct size take a piece of white Jap tissue (use the good stuff here, not





domestic) large enough to cover the printed area. Spray a light coat of removable tack cement, available at art stores, on the dull side of the tissue. Stick it down over the area that will print, shiny side up, and run it through your printer. Remove immediately from the bond paper base and let ink dry. Once dry, dust on a couple of coats of Testers Dull Coat to seal the ink.

After all of the top surfaces are dry use powdered white chalk (scrape the chalk powder from a piece of art quality chalk bought when you get the spray cement) and a cotton ball to rub into the back side of the tissue. It will take 2 or 3 times, followed by a light spray dusting of fixative after each application, to make the tissue opaque enough to let the white areas be really white when applied. Once dry again apply a glue stick to the back of the markings and let everything dry at least overnight and a couple of days is better. You're now ready to cut the markings out and apply them.

To apply cut out marking, place exactly where you want them and touch with a soft paint brush wet down with denatured alcohol. The alcohol will re-moisten the glue from the glue stick and set it into place. If the roundel or star is a bit off, re-moisten it lightly and shift it. Very little moisture is used in this method of making and applying markings so your tissue stays drier. Once in place and dry, dust on a coat of clear Krylon to double seal the edges.

George Mackey George Mackey has recently started coming

to the Cloudbusters lunches. He is a retired pattern maker with an interesting background. George went from building model tow-line

gliders to become a wood pattern maker. He started making m o d e l gliders in the late 1940's and later got a 1/48 Stinson Reliant job making wood patterns for the automobile industry's stamping dies. Later he worked for a company making w o o d patterns for plastic injection molding dies. The

patterns were first made two-and –a half times as large as the finished part. A low melting bismuth alloy, called Kirksite, was cast around the wood pattern to make the preliminary die. This die was put into a pantograph that had a pointer on one side and a fine steel cutting tool on the other side. The pantograph was adjusted to cut a steel die two-and-a half times smaller

than the Kirksite die. This made the final die with finer details. The plastic injection molds were sold to automotive companies for their interior and trim parts, to Lionel Trains for their box cars and also to AMT for a variety of models, including airplanes, boats, trucks, cars and

construction equipment. Each part in a plastic model had to be made out of wood first.

The photos show the relationship between the wood patterns and the resulting plastic parts for an AMT kit of the Stinson SR-9. Unfortunately, few of the wood patterns survived having the Kirksite metal cast around them. The wood pattern was often chiseled out of the mold. The SR-9 patterns shown survived.

George was lucky in that his job and hobby overlapped. He made many scale model airplanes and ships for his own pleasure, a few are shown in the photos. Along the way George's interest in tow-line gliders continued. The photo of George shows his latest model glider, made a few weeks ago.

Dan Olah, a Cloudbusters Model Airplane Club member, felt privileged to visit George's workroom to hear the stories and take photos of his museum quality work.

Cloudbusters at Potterville

As I got back into Free Flight over the last year, I was contacted by a gentleman named Chuck Deyo. Chuck lives in the greater Lansing area (somewhere) and works with the Potterville school system. He invited me to attend their monthly Indoor Fun-Fly events at the Potterville High School gym, held the 3rd Sunday of the month during the winter



months, this year, November-April, excluding February. He promised that these were relatively well attended informal events and free flight models of all sorts could be flown between noon and 4pm. I vaguely remembered flying there 12-15 years ago once or twice and looked forward to visiting Potterville again.

Prior to visiting in December, I contacted my flying buddies Chris Boehm and Winn Moore from the Flint area. They promised to drive down (roughly an hour from Flint) and participate. We have now attended the December and January events and had a great time.

In December, Chris and Winn brought planes and I just attended to socialize. In January, not only did I bring planes, but I brought my two sons, Jack and Tris. Tris even built a Phantom Flash, starting about 10pm the night before and we covered it in the morning before we left for Potterville. This is his first plane and we worked to get it flying. I, personally, brought two Peanuts, two No-Cals, my Flash, and even a Sleek Streak. Chris and Winn had a variety of Peanuts, Golden Age, No-Cals and Flashes.


Overall, there were about 20-30 people in attendance in January, from pre-teens to octogenarians, all flying whatever they liked; even a couple micro R/C planes. There were hand launch gliders, P-30s built light enough to fly slowly indoors, Jetco ROGs, Blatter 40s, and several Bostonians and Embryos.

The room is essentially a high school basketball gym, with room on the sides for a few rows of bleachers (they are mostly folded in). The ceiling is a smooth suspended ceiling about 20-25 feet high. Unfortunately, there are speakers hanging down in the center and 4-bulb, 4-foot fluorescent light fixtures and basket supports also hanging down. But there are no girders and no huge mercury vapor lights. And the ventilation fans are turned off, so it's a fairly clean area to fly.

Overall, it is a nice, relaxed experience. Some of us don't have regular opportunities to fly indoors and, of course, there are risks trimming outdoor planes for indoors. But a day of flying is a good day. And four hours of flying time is longer than 1.5 hours. So, some of you east-siders might consider the trip over to Potterville in March. The school is less than a mile off of Route 69, Exit 66. Detailed directions can be provided by emailing me or Chris or Winn. I hope to see you there!
